20 Years of WHO FCTC: Keeping a Wary Eye

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the World Health Organization (WHO) Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC). Throughout this week, we will share key milestones and reflections on the evolution of the treaty and its impact over the past two decades. Since its unanimous adoption in 2003 by the World Health Assembly and its entry into force in 2005, the WHO FCTC has stood as the first international treaty negotiated under the auspices of the WHO. Today, it remains one of the most widely ratified treaties in United Nations history. Over the years, the Convention has expanded its scope and influence, shaping global tobacco control policies and inspiring new international frameworks. At the same time, the International Tobacco Growers' Association (ITGA) has played a key role in advocating for the concerns of tobacco-growing communities, especially in response to proposals that could directly impact tobacco production and rural livelihoods.

The ITGA's Position at COP11 - By José Aranda **ITGA President**

The ITGA has conducted field research to understand how growers are coping with rising challenges. The WHO FCTC is one of these, as experience shows that new agenda items have sometimes been introduced without notice, in a manipulative way.

Our goal at COP11 is to promote dialogue and provide reliable data on the tobacco sector's socioeconomic



contribution in producing countries. The data presented at COP meetings often fail to reflect reality, and the stigma against our sector persists.

The ITGA legitimately represents tobacco growers worldwide. Farmers and rural communities remain the weakest link in the value chain and deserve to be heard. Any measure affecting their livelihoods could have irreversible consequences, ultimately impacting the entire value chain.
