

Varietal distribution in Italy












Variable gross pay/ha and average purchase prices over the last 5 years



MST and Italy Complementary Objectives: Tobacco Cultivation, Employment, Investment, and Sustainability



MST e l'Italia

- Job security approximately 400 people in Italy on 2024 with salaries of over €25 million
- Four local sites (Lucca, Cava de' Tirreni, Foiano della Chiana, Rome)
- Excise revenue of over €45 million, plus €34 million in VAT
- Approximately 2.1 million kg of DF tobacco purchased in Italy for a value of over €25 million
- Approximately 200 tobacco growing companies
- Approximately 2.000 indirect employees

Sostenibilità filiera tabacchi DF

- Memorandum of Understanding with MIPAF for the purchase of all Kentucky tobacco produced in Italy from 2022 to 2025, ten-year agreement with MASAF from 2025 to 2035
- Promotion and participation in the DF tobacco supply chain roundtable
- Manual of Good Agricultural Practices;
- Incentive projects aimed at generational turnover and infrastructure investments





- The development of the Kentucky tobacco supply chain in Italy, primarily for agricultural producers, cannot ignore the resolution of the main underlying issues and a focus on strategic objectives, which can be summarized as follows:
- the progressive aging of farmers and the need to attract young people;
- stabilizing producer incomes, counteracting increasingly frequent and unpredictable fluctuations, often linked to reduced yields due to adverse weather conditions or the emergence of plant diseases not covered by traditional non-life insurance, but also to unexpected increases in production costs, particularly for raw materials, inputs, and labor;
- research and testing of new technologies for tobacco cultivation and processing aimed at reducing environmental impact and optimizing economic efficiency;
- identifying innovative and effective systems to ensure the recurring availability of adequately trained seasonal labor for farms;
- promoting the ongoing training of farmers and all supply chain workers, taking into account the specificities of some production phases of DF tobacco (e.g., fire-curing).





- o For years, MST has been incentivizing and supporting production with a **price increase policy** aimed at ensuring the long-term sustainability of crops, given rising raw material and energy costs, as well as significant labor supply challenges and the frequent occurrence of hailstorms:
 - > Price increases for strategic grades (quality range and fillings);
 - > Incentives per hectare cultivated and per kg delivered;
- Incentives to support generational turnover: support for infrastructure investments (e.g., agricultural vehicles, warehouses, curing ovens, etc.);
- Technical-agronomic support projects: technical-agronomic experimentation (testing new seed varieties/cultivars, new cultivation techniques and use of plant protection products, updates to the care phase, digitalization projects) with the goal of minimizing the use of resources/materials and thus reducing costs associated with cultivation with lower environmental impact and sustainability;





- Support for businesses and associations in participating in development/investment programs related to the supply chain: the Tuscany Region's Integrated Supply Chain Project, Supply Chain and District Contracts (V Call), Participation/Promotion of the Technical Roundtable on Kentucky Tobacco established at MASAF;
- Technological innovation projects by MST supplier farms for the implementation of precision agriculture with the aim of optimizing and rationalizing the use of water and pesticides;
- New production trials in other areas: revitalization of suitable areas and in areas historically producing DF tobacco.
